That's...

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

A composite of AB+ blood and the growing media gel from the botany lab that we suspend little baby seeds in. I don't recognize the symbology, though.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

It looks like it might be a crude sort of map.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Do you know Tom's blood type?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

О-.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

So it's not him that left this, then?

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Thank God. You said it looks like a map?

AMSEL, CLARK

The only other missing person is Andrew Brookshaw. Maybe it was him?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Do you know Brookshaw's blood type?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

No- I only know Tom's as a result of an in field transfusion.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Oh, that sounds scary.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Well, he was never one to shy from the seemingly insurmountable.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Isn't one, you mean.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

...It looks like a map, yes. That symbol near the top left is one used for the generator room, on blueprints of the warren down there.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Tom showed you them?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Tom used to write poetry on the backs of photocopies of them, yes. He wrote it on everything.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Why would Brookshaw be in the generator room? It's hot down there.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

It is one of the places built to last through an emergent catastrophe. Without it, the whole ship would essentially implode.

Oh, so it would be safe down there?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

I assume so.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

We should check there, then. Teddy, how fresh is the blood?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I need to get closer to it to see.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Clark, can you walk up there?

AMSEL, CLARK

Yeah, sure.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I'd estimate it at a benchmark of 7 days, 22 hours, 13 minutes. I don't know if you'd like to have that information in seconds or smaller SI increments? I can, but that seems like a lot. The media's interfered with the dry out process though, so it's only an estimate.

AMSEL, CLARK

Huh. Interesting.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

The second car goes downstairs into the 'rabbit warren.'

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Hold on, I think there's a copy of the blueprint here. I'll grab the others, too.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

I guess there's no point in hiding them away anymore.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Alright, got it.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I don't have hands. Someone else is going to have to open the car doors, please.

AMSEL, CLARK

Ah, sorry. Here-

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Oh no.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Christ.

AMSEL, CLARK

Oh. That's certainly something.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Who is it?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Dr. Sylvester, judging from the shoes.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Shoes?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

There's a little golden pin on the laces. It was his good luck charm.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Well, he doesn't seem very lucky.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

U.R.S.A!

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Oh, is that not nice?

AMSEL, CLARK

It was a little mean, Teddy.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

A bit too on the nose.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I don't have a nose?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Moving on from- that, what are we... Are we going to ride the car with him inside?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Well, do you want to pick him up?

AMSEL, CLARK

Unless you want to move him.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

You can't be serious.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I don't have hands!

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Jesus. Is there something we can cover him with, at least?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

There's a fire blanket if you hit the back panelling hard enough to pop out the panel. There's no smoke, but it's broken enough that you can if you just bump it.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Okay, then. Let me just--

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

There. It's not a proper shroud, but we'll figure out something proper for him later.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I guess try not to bump him around too much, or step on him. Isn't it Clark's job to figure out how people died?

AMSEL, CLARK

Yeah- That's what I do. Mostly.

U.R.S.A. TEDDY

What else do you do?

AMSEL, CLARK

Figure out what happened to cause all the deaths. Like, maybe someone suffocated, but I have to figure out how and why.

FAIRWEATHER. HENRI

Do you know what happened with the ship? I don't think you've mentioned it, except with what happened with Teddy.

AMSEL, CLARK

Still trying to figure that out. I haven't made it to the bridge to get to the black box.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I assume that's our next stop on this journey through hell. Someone's turned down the generator's temperature.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Is that supposed to happen? Can you tell from whose credentials?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

No, but it's a possibility to override in the event of low fuel. It's to help prevent things from superheating and exploding.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Who would have access?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Anyone in R&D, past a particular clearance level- same with Communications and Engineering.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

So it doesn't narrow down the list of suspects.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

No, not particularly.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Is it still safe to go down there?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

How cold can people get?

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Not very.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Not below 35 degrees celsius.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Oh, I don't think so. But if Tom is down there, why would he turn the heating down if he's still inside?

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

We don't have much time, then.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

We should be arriving at the entrance to the warren soon.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

U.R.S.A, an estimated time of arrival?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Five minutes, and 23... 22.... roughly 20 seconds.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

That's slower than usual.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

There's debris in the shaft. I've been trying to dislodge most of it with the pressurized air spigot thingies.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Spigot thingies?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

That's what Dave calls them.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

What kind of debris?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Uhm, it's squishy.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Oh Christ.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Jesus.

AMSEL, CLARK

Oh.

AMSEL, CLARK

More work for future Clark.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Sorry...

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Not the time.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

...Can you get an ID ping on any of the bodies?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

There's some cards down at the base, but most of them are broken or, uhm. The ping can't read through all the squish. You'd have to clean off the shiny bits on the cards for them to bounce back properly.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

That's... Unpleasant.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Extremely.

AMSEL, CLARK

It's not the worst thing I've had to deal with. There was this one ship where-

AMSEL, CLARK

Never mind. I just realized how morbid that would sound.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

I think this whole situation is morbid. ETA?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Ten seconds.

SCORESBY. LAUREL

Well, get ready, then.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

...Clark, is it? Do you have any eye protection? You're carrying a multi-billion dollar artificial intelligence in your orbital socket.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Oh! Are you giving him the dummy goggles?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Is that what they're calling them these days?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Dave says so because it looks like swimming goggles and like you're a little goldfish.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Funny. But yes, if he wouldn't mind.

AMSEL, CLARK

Hand me the goldfish goggles. I don't want to damage Teddy.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Here you are.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

U.R.S.A, can you get an identification from this distance?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

No... But there are a lot of cards cluttering up the hallways. We're also really close to Laundry.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

That explains some of the smell.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

...Teddy, are you able to open the doors?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

They're stuck.

AMSEL, CLARK

That's not good.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

No, it isn't. Anything else in the back panel?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

There's a window breaker, Tom put it there because he had to break his way out of the top of this elevator shaft once.

But I don't know if any of you can hit as hard as he can.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

No offense.

AMSEL, CLARK

None taken.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

No, you're probably right. We can try and use it to pry the doors open?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

You can try!

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

I can't get it open any further--

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Well, I think you're going to need some help with that one. If you give me a moment, I can assess where you should be focusing your lever.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Clark, can you see that?

AMSEL, CLARK

Yeah, I can.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Okay! Put your hands there. I put the left and right labels too, so you don't mix up your hands.

AMSEL, CLARK

Alright--

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Got it!

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

We're in!

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Hold it.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

What's wrong?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

...How much of your internal communications are impaired, U.R.S.A?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I can't tell, because I can't see.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Well- don't move forwards. Someone's activated the tripwires.

Oh that's not good.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

No. that isn't.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Isn't that for in the event of something escaping from the Anatomy labs or boarding through one of the lower loading bays for supplies and internal transport?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Yes.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

So what are we going to do about it?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

...I wish Tom was here. There's a way to lower them, but you'd need to have a good hand to knock out the main epicentre by the rafters.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

I wish Tom was here too. He's nice.

AMSEL, CLARK

What do the tripwires activate?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Oh, then the tunnel collapses.

AMSEL, CLARK

Oh. That's not good.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

It's supposed to contain whatever breaches the area, to prevent it from getting to the car that leads to the bridge for the cockpit.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

ust what we needed. Where are the tripwires? Is there a way to avoid them?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

U.R.S.A, can you kill the lights?

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Oh, that's a good idea. Then they'll be red!

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Well, if you have Clark's eyes it will.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

Dr. Scoresby, what about the archivist?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

You never got the ocular implants?

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

No. Never liked the idea of them.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

I-- I'm going to have to stay behind, aren't I?

SCORESBY, LAUREL

It would be safest.

U.R.S.A, TEDDY

But we don't know who else is on board? I mean, we found you two.

SCORESBY, LAUREL

Probably not the time to bring that up, U.R.S.A.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

I'll stay, then.

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Just--

FAIRWEATHER, HENRI

Never-mind. Be safe.
